This will create a special fund to be drawn from when we need it across the next few fiscal years to balance the budget and fund initiatives in the Operating Budget.
Article 4 (To appropriate \$3,132,074 into the Override Stabilization Fund)  *Passed	Yes - Again, I was excited to vote in favor of this Article to place these funds in reserve so that we may draw from it when we need it rather than spending the total value of the override in one fiscal year.

Yes - This amendment includes Juneteenth as a paid holiday for Town personnel, adds "Indigenous People's Day/Columbus Day" to the calendar, creates a formal introductory period of 6 months for new employees and transfers/promotions, and updates the sick time/ bereavement policies to require proper documentation. These changes are positive, and reflect the Town's commitment to be more inclusive as it moves forward, and thus I was very happy to support this. Further examination should occur in order to see whether or not "Columbus Day" should still be included in the calendar. I would support its removal, but would like to see this studied further and for more discussion to be had here in Town regarding that issue.
Yes - These changes allow for more flexibility at Town Meeting, and will make the meetings more efficient by using the methods we adapted to during the COVID-19 Pandemic. A consent agenda, bundling Articles together, and other changes to the Bylaw will shorten the length of time it takes for us to conduct business into one day rather than across several nights, like before. These changes might also encourage folks to run for Town Meeting, as it decreases the time commitment necessary to conduct business.

Article 29 (To establish the Community Preservation Committee in the General Bylaws  Substituted Motion: To require the 4 at-large members be Elected rather than Appointed by the Selectmen - Defeated: Yes - 60, No - 101)	Yes (Substituted Motion - Yes) - I was a strong proponent of the CPA when we voted on it in 2020. The establishment of the Committee begins the process of seeing CPA projects at future Town Meetings. I supported the proposed amendment because I think there is a great benefit to having these members be accountable to the people that voted to adopt the CPA. Giving the community a more immediate and direct mechanism to be involved in the CPA process increases transparency and accountability. This also gives the public more opportunities to serve the community, though this can be said for the position in general regardless of whether or not it is appointed or elected. As we see how the CPC operates in the next few years, I

Article 35 (Citizens petition to establish term limits to the Board of Selectmen and School Committee)  *Defeated	No - I do not believe in removing the power of choice from voters, and thus do not support term limits. The power of self government is derived from the people, and ultimately they should be the ones to decide how long an elected official serves. If they so choose to re-elect someone to the same position, then they ought to have that right to do so. Every year voters are given the power to elect ½ of the elected positions of the Town, which gives them plenty of opportunity to elect leaders who will bring in new ideas to Town.
